### **A Death In The Family**

I must tell you that my original column for this months issue of Hallmarks was to focus on the upcoming events at MCHS. I wanted to talk about the new exhibit, and my excitement regarding Marion's' connection to the Civil War. All of this I will do, but in the next issue. My excitement and focus changed on the morning of Wednesday, February 20th. My life, as did all of yours, changed when I received the call that our beloved Trella had passed from this life to the next.

My introduction to Trella came a mere five years ago while I was preparing to participate in my first Night at Heritage Hall. I, of course, had heard and read of this woman through her work in the community and her connection to the Marion County Historical Society. Little did I know that we would form a bond and a friendship that I will cherish for the rest of my life.

I cannot add to the accolades that have been printed or said about Trella over the last several days. There have already been so many people that have done that so well. As I listened to family and friends eulogize her at the funeral service, I thought to myself how lucky I was to have been a small part of her life. When I lost my mother to cancer in July of 2009 I was devastated. Trella stepped in and took the role of surrogate mother, a part she played to so many others as well. This is a woman who touched many lives in her 97 years. Trella will go on touching lives in her writings, her generous donations to community, and to those of us who will continue to " pay it forward " in her name.

Trella was the " heart and soul " of the Marion County Historical Society. She was still attending meetings and functions at MCHS as well as playing an active role in the continuing promotion and development of Heritage Hall, the Linn School, the Prairies, and the Research Center. Trella was a sounding board for Gale and myself. She had an incredible mind and a memory that anyone thirty years her junior would envy. She was always looking ahead, but never forgetting the history of where we had been.

To say that we will miss Trella is certainly an understatement. We will cherish our memories of her forever and celebrate her legacy every day.

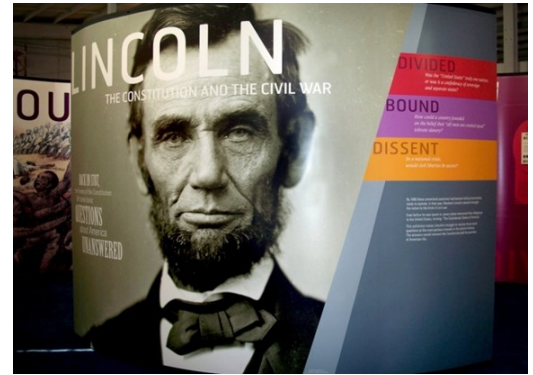

**The Marion County Historical Society is proud to announce that they will be hosting, “Lincoln: The Constitution and the Civil War”** a traveling exhibition developed by the American Library Association (ALA) Public Programs Office and the National Constitution Center (NCC) from April 20 through May 26, 2013. Museum admission is free from 1-4 pm on April 20, 21, 27 and 28. Admission to the museum will continue to be free Wednesday through Sunday May 1- 26. *The exhibit’s visit will officially open on April 20th at 1 pm with historian Robert Brugler presenting as Abraham Lincoln in the museum auditorium at 2 pm.*



Using the Constitution as the cohesive thread, “Lincoln: The Constitution and the Civil War” offers a fresh and innovative perspective on Lincoln focusing on his struggle to meet the political and constitutional challenges of the Civil War. The exhibition explores how Lincoln used the Constitution to confront three intertwined crises of the war—the secession of Southern states, slavery, and wartime civil liberties. Visitors will leave the exhibition with a more complete understanding of Abraham Lincoln as president and the Civil War as the nation’s gravest constitutional crisis.

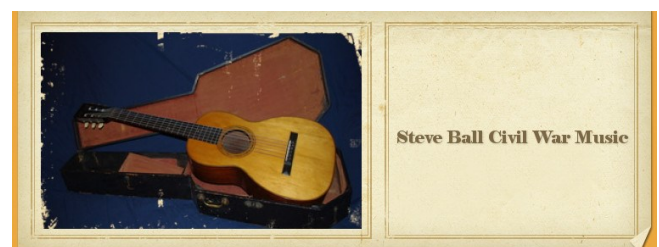

**Our May 23 program meeting at 7pm in the Heritage Hall auditorium will be on Civil War Music with the program provided by Steve Ball,** a musician and historian from Columbus, Ohio. Steve started both playing the guitar and studying the American Civil War at the age of twelve. His interest in Civil War music was generated by tunes he learned while in a western trio. Eventually he built a repertoire of songs from the 19th century, both before and during the Civil War period of 1861 to 1865. His interest in the history of the war led to learning about the composers, and the events that led to many of the songs of the period being written. The songs are presented in a somewhat chronological order. Steve tells the story of each song and keeps listeners informed of the progress of the war at the same time. Steve will have CD's available at the event for anyone who may be interested. This will be the third program related to the Civil War for this year’s events. It is made possible by funding through the National Endowment for the Humanities, the National Constitution Center, and the American Library Association.

## MARION'S MUSIC

Many towns have been popularized in song titles over the years. Examples such as “Chattanooga Choo Choo,” “New York New York,” and “I Left My Heart in San Francisco” come quickly to mind. The same holds true for people’s names such as “Elvira,” “Sweet Caroline,” and “Hey Jude” just to name a few. But how many people realize that Marion, and her most famous native son, have also been the subjects of numerous songs?

A search through the archives at Heritage Hall turned up more than 35 songs featuring Marion or Warren Harding. While none of them probably made the Billboard Top 40, they are an important part of our history and deserve to be remembered.

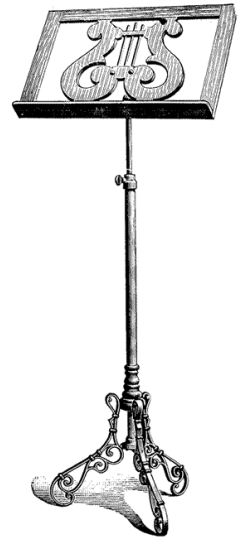
Early in the twentieth century many local communities had active groups of citizens leading the charge to outlaw the “devil’s milk”. They were eventually successful when in 1919 the Eighteenth Amendment established the prohibition of the manufacture, sale or transportation of alcoholic beverages. Marion appears to have been an active participant in the effort as at least four songs were written in an attempt to convince voters to approve prohibition: “No More Saloons in Marion County” (to the tune of “Marching Thru’ Georgia”), “Marion Must Go Free” (to the tune of “America”), “Vote for Local Option” (to the tune of “Tramp, Tramp, Tramp”) and “Battle Hymn of County Option” (to the “Battle Hymn of the Republic”). No record was found of songs that took the stance of keeping alcohol legal, but it is a fair bet that some, while perhaps not published, were belted out in the local taverns.

In 1922, “Marion, My Marion” was written by Isabelle Virginia Freeland in honor of the centennial celebration of Marion’s founding. It was sung to the tune of “Maryland, My Maryland”. Dick B. Brun composed “Good Old Marion Town” for the same occasion.

While the city of Marion did have its musical notoriety, it did not hold a candle to the number of songs written about her favorite son, Warren G. Harding. Over 28 different songs were put forth as part of the Harding campaign efforts. Perhaps the most well-known was “Harding – You’re the Man for Us” written by none other than Al Jolson. Jolson, who was known at the time as the world’s greatest entertainer, actually visited Marion to help in Harding’s Front Porch Campaign. Other Harding songs included “Mr. Harding, We Will Vote for You”, “President Harding March”, “H-A-R-D-I-N-G – The Man for Us”, and “Rah! Rah! Rah! for Warren G. Harding”.

The Republican Party published “America First – Republican Campaign Song Book” featuring 21 different songs designed to help their candidate secure the highest office in the land. Among them were “Harding Marches On” (to the tune of “When Johnnie Comes Marching Home”), “Warren I’ve Been Thinking” (to the tune of “Reuben, Reuben, I’ve Been Thinking”), “The Two Guardsmen” (to the tune of “Dixie”), and “Coxy Doodle” (to the tune of “Yankee Doodle”). Apparently they were of assistance as Harding won the election in a landslide victory over his opponent, Ohio Governor James M. Cox. Harding earned over 60% of the popular vote, the largest margin of victory in the modern era.

Whether used to celebrate an occasion, champion a cause, or even just for enjoyment, music is part of our lives, and also part of our history.

She spent many hours explaining Marion history, was my confidant, and my mentor as I struggled to learn what it took to act as the director of the Marion County Historical Society. In her honor, I am submitting this article she sent me last January for inclusion in Hallmarks.

### BUST OF WARREN G. HARDING

Visitors walking along the hall in the lower level of Heritage Hall will see a white plaster bust of Warren G. Harding. Few would know how it came to be there but I found the explanation in the book "Lest We Forget—Vignettes of Morrow County, Ohio by Charles and Delpha Mosher. The quote below is found on page 99.

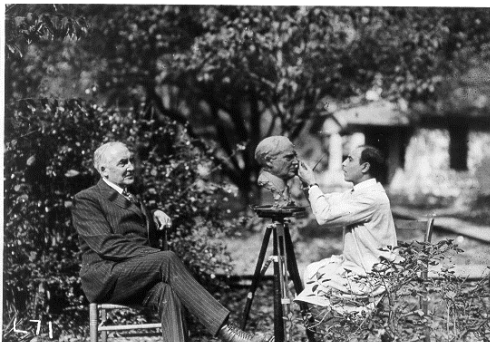
"My wife, D. Ruth Mosher, served as the catalyst in locating and returning a bust made of Warren Gamaliel Harding. About 1990 Ruth was caring for Marion Meister, daughter of a country doctor and mother of Paul Meister of Marion. One day the subject of President Harding came up, and Marion mentioned that an artist named Sue Watson Marshall had sculpted a bust of Harding. She also recalled that during Senator Warren G. Harding's presidential campaign in 1920 the bust had been part of a display in the show window at the Kleinmaier Men's Clothing store located at the southeast corner of Center and Prospect Streets in Marion in the Busby building. The profile was silhouetted on a sheet producing a dramatic effect that many thought was the candidate himself.

Ruth suggested to Marion Meister that the bust would be an interesting addition to the growing collection of Harding memorabilia soon to be housed in the former Marion post office located on the southeast corner of Church and State Streets. The Society had recently acquired it and renamed it "Heritage Hall."

With Paul Meister's assistance, contact was made with Charles Kleinmaier, then in his 90's, and it was learned that he was willing to donate the bust which had been stored in the attic of his New Jersey home for many years.

At that time Jack Telfer, as director of the new Marion County Historical Society, -was overseeing the transformation of the former Marion Post Office building into a museum an headquarters for the Society. Three rooms had been reserved as "Harding Rooms." When Ruth told him of the bust, and its availability, he contacted the son of Charles Kleinmaier and through him secured the bust for the Society.

Just after the bust arrived at Heritage Hall Ruth and I stood with Dr. Telfer and Dick West (a trustee of the Society) examining it. Since it was made of plaster of Paris, and was very fragile, it had been damaged in shipment. However, Dr. Telfer was able to have it restored. A pedestal and glass showcase was obtained to display this welcome addition to the Harding Collections at Heritage Hall. Mr. Kleinmaier's contribution is commemorated on a bronze plate."
