

WHAT'S NEW IN THE MCHS COLLECTIONS?

William Barnhart – WW II Master Sergeant army fatigue uniform; Metal "U.S. Mail – No Riders" sign; United States Postal Service uniform; Four Marion Harding H.S. Quiver yearbooks (1929-1932)

Richard Carey – Collection of U.S. Postal Service First Day covers and envelopes with related research materials; Collection of Civil War era correspondence (1862-1888); Collection of Marion County correspondence 1843-1899; Marion County Auditor's Ledger (1837-1845)

Su S. Rowles – Assorted shoes, hats, and other clothing. Key items in the collection are Su S Weir Rowles 1959 Ridgedale Junior Prom dress, a ruffled light slate blue organdy with light lavender underlining, 1960 Senior prom dress made of white organdy with a shaded blue waistband and large blue bow in back. Rounding out the collection is her wedding dress, worn on September 19, 1964, made of white satin with scooped neckline in a sheath style with long sleeves and satin covered buttons. It has a full circular satin detachable over-skirt that has two satin bows, with skirt flaring out to a mid-length train .
