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FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK: by Gale E. Martin, Executive Director



The staff at the Marion County Historical Society would like to wish you a very Merry Christmas!

In this time of great cheer and gift giving, donations to those in need adds to the joy of the season. We here at MCHS believe we have all been blessed in many ways. Let me share two examples of how donations have and will continue to make a huge impact at Heritage Hall.

In November of 2012, Lowell Thurston, Howie Smith, Nick Chilton and Ted Graham got together and bought an Eden Pure Heater for the MCHS offices. It was

very much appreciated as our offices have no source of heat until the boiler is turned on in early winter!

That heater was even more appreciated later in January of 2013 when the heat pump went out in the auditorium and the heater had to be taken down there for the groups who use the room on a regular basis.

This fall the heater came back upstairs because the heat pumps in the Wyandot Popcorn Museum were out, making the entire upper level cold, and then we found the boiler needed extensive repairs before it could be turned on for the winter. Working in gloves and winter coat is still commonplace as the boiler is not up and running yet.

Last week we received an incredible bit of good news concerning another gift. Daniel Conkle called and let us know that the Marion County Historical Society will be receiving a gift in the memory of Louis Bernard Conkle and his wife Berniece Elizabeth Conkle. The gift is \$50,000 dollars and will be used toward a new boiler system and a heat pump for the director and administrative assistant's offices!



Louis's children, Cynthia Antone, of Marion, Ohio, Judith Roberts, of Minneapolis, Minnesota, Daniel Conkle, of Bloomington, Indiana, and James Conkle, of Missoula, Montana, are each gifting \$12,500 to MCHS. In 2014 we will be placing a bronze plaque at Heritage Hall, commemorating the gift in the name of Louis and Berniece Conkle.

What wonderful news that a family, now scattered around the U. S., is willing to be so generous in the name of their father. This donation really adds to the absolute joy of the season for the staff and board members of the Marion County Historical Society.

Thus it appears that we will have a toasty warm building next winter, thanks to the generosity of the Conkle family! That makes the chill in our offices a little bit easier to bear. We all have so many reasons to be grateful!

The images below are: before restoration on the left and after restoration on the right.



The silhouettes of the von Heyde family on the right date to the late 1830s to mid 1840s. In the images you can clearly tell which are before and after restoration. The majority of the figures are black silhouette with accents in color. The overall condition of the object was fair to poor with excessive media loss and structural instability of the glazed areas of the media.

Money’s left to MCHS from the late Dorothy Young were used to preserve this rare and unusual piece.

Exploring MARION'S HISTORY THROUGH POSTCARDS

Most people have received a postcard at some point in their life but may not realize that for many years postcards were the most popular means of communicating other than talking. At the height of their popularity in 1908, more than 677 million postcards were mailed in a single year. This was an average of seven postcards for every man, woman, and child in the country! With twice-a-day mail delivery in many parts of the country, a card could be sent in the morning and possibly arrive at the recipient's address in the evening mail.

On Thursday, November 21, the Marion County Historical Society hosted local historian and author Randy Winland who shared the history of the development and use of postcards as well as the history of Marion as seen through them. The program included an audio-visual presentation of some of the more than 1000 Marion postcards in Winland's personal collection as well as ones from other Marion collectors. The focus was also on the different types of postcards that have been popular throughout the past 100 years with views of Marion used as examples. Also included in the program were views of several Marion buildings which are no longer standing.




As part of the evening's activities, Winland's just-published book on the history of Marion as seen through postcards was available for purchase for the first time. Guests were thrilled to have the early opportunity to pick up the book which features over 200 postcard images of scenes from around Marion. Many of the images, such as one of a cannon manufactured by the Marion Steam Shovel Company, had never been published and were subsequently rarely seen. Winland collaborated with several other Marion postcard collectors to obtain the images for the book which also contains narrative descriptions for each of the images. All proceeds and royalties from the sale of the book are being donated to the Marion County Historical Society for its historic preservation efforts.

The book, priced at \$21.99, is now available at the Heritage Hall gift shop and online at www.marionhistory.com.

History can be entertaining for both youngsters and adults as evidenced by this Activity Book. Responding to a need for resource materials on local history by Marion area elementary school teachers, a group comprised of both working and retired teachers, local artists, and the Director of MCHS combined to create an entirely original publication. With a primary focus on activities which younger students can complete while also learning about significant aspects of Marion's history, the activities and information also proved to be of interest to older audiences including adults.

Incorporating all original art works donated by Marion area artists, the book utilizes cross-words, coloring pages, connect-the-dots, word finds, Morse code, word scrambles and various other activities to cover a wide range of Marion history topics. While most of the activities are designed for younger students, there are also several "Challenge Pages" which require more skills to complete. Also included are more than 75 "Vocabulary Helpers" which assist the students with understanding words within the context of which they are used. The publication was honored by the Ohio Local History Alliance as a winner of the 2011 History Outreach Award.

HISTORY IS FLEETING

The end of another year is quickly approaching and I am reminded of how short our time in this life really is. January and February brought the change of our main exhibit from the War of 1812 to the War Between The States. Those of you who have worked on an exhibit change can appreciate just how busy these two months can be. The changing of a major exhibit consumes a lot of the Director's time, both in planning and designing the layout of the atrium. We at MCHS are fortunate to have Gale at the helm of this very important process. As the museum prepares to open in March each year, all of the last minute adjustments and final changes must be in place and ready for the opening. This is a very critical time for the staff and volunteers as we await your first look at our "new baby".

The end of March brings Night at Heritage Hall, one of our favorite and fun events of the year. This event alone can involve as many as 75 or more volunteers when re-enactors and staffing are included. Of course, those of us portraying historical characters get a chance to relive our childhood and participate in "dress-up". Trust me it is a lot of fun and you too can become a part of this event. This program has been a great way to encourage many of our younger people to become interested in our history and help to secure the future of MCHS.

With the approach of spring, we prepared for our annual themed dinner that was held at the Palace Pavilion. This year's dinner included a very lively panel discussion involving many colorful characters from the Civil War. The event was catered by Primrose of Marion, who of course, did a great job with the meal and the service. Shamrock Vineyards provided a wine tasting with a number of their very fine local wines.

Rolling into summer we again provided a very active presence at the Marion County Fair by opening and staffing our log house. The annual bake sale held at the log house netted a very nice amount of money for our budget. As always, our volunteers answered the call in providing a nice selection of baked goods.

The log house and its contents got a much needed facelift this summer thanks to volunteers Ed Schweinfurth and John Murphy. These two men white-washed the inside of the house, and built or acquired all of the furnishings needed to make our log structure correct to the period of its construction. We are indeed grateful and very appreciative of their unselfish efforts.

July and August again brought the annual Blast From The Past program to the youth of our area. This program, which provides a free summer historical educational program to kids, was chaired by Randy and Sandy Winland. The program takes place over four consecutive Thursdays during July and August and involves many dedicated volunteers, many of whom are retired educators. Randy and Sandy were assisted by Jan Augenstein and Carol Robinson, who led the program for many years, along with many others. Thank you to all of those volunteers who helped with this very valuable part of MCHS.

September brought the second annual Travel Through Time event held again this year at Sawyer-Ludwig Park. This year's theme was the Civil War and involved the 121st OVI, a very valuable part of MCHS. Jared Haudenschild and Mark Melroy created and orchestrated a foraging trip through the woods with General William Sherman's army in search of provisions and contraband. There were army encampments, field hospital demonstrations, cannon firings, craft demonstrations, vendors, food and entertainment for all of those attending. This event was free to the public and a way to involve more people in experiencing living history at its best.

The Marion County Historical Society participated in the Popcorn Festival Parade again this year. Much to the enjoyment of all the parade-goers we were able to once again fire the cannon from the back of our float.

The month of October brought the second year of our Behind Closed Doors tour. This year the tour featured the Ohio Theatre/Elks Building, Huber Home, Owens Opera House, Receiving Vault at the Marion Cemetery and the Stengel-True Museum. This event was well received with over 300 people visiting one or more of the scheduled sights. Many thanks to Randy Winland for organizing the event and to all of the volunteers acting as hosts or helping at the various locations. This has indeed become one of our most anticipated events as voiced by the attendees.

The arrival of election day also meant the annual Dinner With The Presidents, held this year on November 2nd at Treca. This was the 4th Annual and thus far the most attended dinner. This year's event featured all Civil War era presidents, including Lincoln, Johnson, Grant and Garfield representing the United States of America. Also in attendance was Jefferson Davis representing the Confederate States of America. Of course, as always, those attending enjoyed a menu of foods that were enjoyed by the various Presidents while they were in the White House.

There were many more events occurring as part of the Marion County Historical Society calendar including participation in the Waldo Memorial Day Parade, the traveling Lincoln and the Constitution Exhibit, Annual Rummage Sale, Claridon Prairie Tour, Trella Romine Prairie Tour, Ham and Bean Dinner and the Book Signing at Heritage Hall on December 7th. I am sure I have forgotten something or someone and if I have please accept my apologies in advance.

As I finish this year, I again want to say thanks to all of you for making my tenure as President a very interesting and enjoyable one. This year I have logged over 1100 hours of volunteer time to the Marion County Historical Society and look forward to one more year as your president. 2014 should be just as challenging as the past two years have been; but, with your help, we will continue to grow MCHS into one of the best in the state.
